In Stillness Knitting Breath, Barragán looms together family lineage, memories, and the world of dreams to create a dance that moves seamlessly through time and cultures, rarefying the here and now with tints of surrealism.

Collaborator and visual artist, Mariana Tejeda, crafted Mesoamerican-inspired masks and textile sculptures that interact with the dancers and transform their appearance to transport them and the audience to different realities.

Stillness Knitting Breath is underscored with original compositions by Douglas Baker and Katie Robbins, who give voice to the tender melody of a traditional lullaby with custom lyrics that Barragán continues to sing to his sons.

Barro (Clay) is inspired by the theme of Quilombos–communities organized by fugitive slaves in colonial Brazil. Located in inaccessible areas, these communities survived by farming and raiding; with the most famous being Palmares, that under the leadership of Zumbi, nationally recognized as one of the greatest Black Brazilian leaders, were able to grow and resist the atrocities of slavery. Specifically, Barro is based on the action of "resistance."

Sombrerísimo

Influenced by her multicultural heritage, Belgian-Colombian choreographer Annabelle Lopez Ochoa takes inspiration from the paintings of René Magritte and Latin music/rhythms to ask questions about identity.

Sombrerísimo explores how cultural identity enriches lives but can also feel weighted for those who find themselves caught between multiple cultural influences. The piece is a physical tour de force pushing the speed and togetherness of the six performers to their limits.

ELOY BARRAGÁN Faculty Choreographer

Eloy Barragán has an MFA degree from Hollins University. Associate Professor, Choreographer, Filmmaker, Founder and Director: International Iowa ScreenDance Festival, Co-Director: Iowa Dance Festival. American College Dance Association Board Member and Screen-Dance Committee Member. Recipient of the choreographers' fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Boise Arts Council, Lifetime Career Fellowship: Idaho



Commission of the Arts. 2017 Artist Project Grant - Iowa Arts Council. Eloy's choreography and films have been presented in Mexico, NYC, Cuba, Finland, France, Panamá, China, and Russia. Performed with Joffrey II, Washington Ballet, Compañía Nacional de Danza México, Ballet Royal de Wallonie, Mainz Stattheater, Eugene Ballet, and Ballet Idaho.

ARMANDO DUARTE Faculty Choreographer

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Armando Duarte's prolific choreographic career includes the creation of 89 original choreographies plus re-staging works for companies and dance programs in the U.S., Europe, and Brazil. As an educator he has worked with all levels of dance artists nationally and internationally. His academic research involves an investigation on Brazilian samba and carnival, for what he created courses at the UI: "Brazilian Culture and Carnival" and "Brazilian



Social Dance, the Samba." He has led students to study abroad in Brazil, and he has presented lectures at universities and conferences throughout the U.S. Most recently, he received the Obermann Fellow (AY23/24), and the prestigious International Teaching Engagement Award from the UI College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the International Program for his teaching and research involvement in international education for UI students.

ANNABELLE LOPEZ OCHOA Guest Choreographer

Annabelle Lopez Ochoa is a prolific and awardwinning choreographer that has created more than 100 ballets for 80 dance companies around the world. Annabelle's choreography career started in 2003. Her wide-ranging body of work includes short conceptual pieces, full-length narratives, and dance films. Annabelle is one of the very few female choreographers who excels in narrative ballet. She has successfully created 14 narrative ballets to



date. In 2019, she received the prestigious Jacob's Pillow Dance Award and was appointed as the program director of the Contemporary Ballet Summer Intensive of the School at Jacob's Pillow.

KRISTIN MARRS Faculty Choreographer

Kristin Marrs explores the evolution of ballet as a technique and narrative form in her choreography and teaching. Past collaborations with composer Jacob Bancks include the original opera *Karkinos*. Marrs is the recent recipient of a Laura Spelman Rockefeller grant through the Obermann Center for Advanced Studies in support of her dance theater work *Chalk*. Co-written and performed with theater artist Anne Marie Nest, *Chalk* will premiere in Iowa City and Denver in 2025.



STEPHANIE MIRACLE Faculty Choreographer

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
Stephanie Miracle is an assistant professor in the Department of Dance, a certified teacher of Klein Technique[™], and the artistic director of the international project *FAKERS CLUB*: a live-cinema public performance. Described as "iconic and nuanced ... with an irreverence that makes you smile unconsciously," her choreography manifests as stage productions, site-specific spectacles,



experimental films, and sound walks. From 2014–15 she was a U.S. Fulbright Fellow to Germany, following which she became a company member and guest choreographer with the Folkwang Tanzstudio. As a professional dancer she has worked with Susan Marshall, Liz Lerman, Deborah Hay, Shannon Gillen/VIM VIGOR, Laura Peterson, and David Dorfman. Stephanie continues to perform with Jennifer Kayle, Heart Stück Bernie, and PEARSONWIDRIG. Jacob Bancks's music has been praised as "invitingly lyrical" (*The New York Times*) and "highly caffeinated" (*The Boston Globe*). Performance and commission credits include the Philadelphia Orchestra, clarinetist Ricardo Morales, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, eighth blackbird, U.S. Marine Band, Quad City Symphony, and others. He has been honored by the National Endowment for the Arts, American Academy of Arts and Letters, BMI,



Tanglewood Festival of Contemporary Music, and others. He serves on the faculty of Augustana College.



DOUGLAS BAKER Composer

Douglas Baker is a professional dance accompanist whose hobbies include composition, dance, video games, languages, and various modes of art and craft. He received a BA degree in piano and Japanese at the University of Iowa and was a Fulbright scholarship recipient in 2015. Douglas is currently employed at the university's Department of Dance as well as the Youth Ballet and Community Dance School.



CHRIS BLOOM Stager

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Chris Bloom is from Fredrick County, VA, where he began dancing at the Blue Ridge Studio for the Performing Arts & Vostrikov Academy of Ballet. Chris graduated Summa Cum Laude from the Ailey/ Fordham BFA Program subsequently dancing for Parsons Dance, the Peridance Company, and Ballet Hispánico. During his decade at Ballet Hispánico, Chris originated roles in new works by Annabelle Lopez Ochoa, Fernando Melo, Michelle Manzanales,



Gustavo Ramírez Sansano, Stephanie Martinez, and many others. Chris is a founding member of PARA.Mar Dance Theatre and currently works as a freelance dancer, choreographer, and stager.

CHRISTIAN CHERRY Composer

Christian Cherry is a multi-instrumentalist, composer, and performer whose work is presented in the U.S. and abroad. *Tales from Dapple Creek* ('22) for Kista Tucker, has won multiple international awards. He presented at II Corpo nel Suono, at the Accademia Nazionale di Danza in Rome in 2019. As a dance educator, Christian was part of several prominent dance departments: Ohio State, the University of South Florida, and the University of Illinois. Christian has served as head,



undergraduate director, and music director at the University of Oregon where he teaches music, dance theory, collaboration, and contact improvisation.

JACK DELANEY Rehearsal Assistant

Jack Delaney is a fourth-year BFA student in the Department of Dance and is the rehearsal assistant for *Stillness Knitting Breath*. He has previously performed in *Dance Gala* 2022 and 2023 where he performed works choreographed by Stephanie Miracle, Aaron Samuel Davis, and Eloy Barragán. KATIE ROBBINS Composer

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Katie Robbins is a dynamic live performance artist, musician, composer, and improviser. She earned a BFA degree from the University of Iowa's Department of Dance, specializing in compositional improvisation and choreography—skills that continue to shape her songwriting today. For nearly 15 years, Katie has been a musical force in Iowa City, energizing audiences with bands like The Fez, OSG, Wefunk, and the Miles Kean Epictet. She is thrilled



to blend her diverse talents and contribute once again to Dance Gala.

SABRINA TABBY Violinist

Since performing at Carnegie Hall as a teenager, violinist Sabrina Tabby has performed in top venues around the world, including Red Rocks, the Taormina Amphitheater in Sicily, and beyond. As a founding member of string guartet ATLYS, she represented Lincoln Center at Sea (including a private performance for Oprah!), and released four original albums with over 16-million streams. She is also a founding member of the NYC-based



ensemble Contemporaneous whose debut at Disney Hall was named one of 2023's "best classical music performances" by The New York Times. Sabrina is concertmaster of the Mankato Symphony, assistant concertmaster of the Owensboro Symphony, and acting principal second of the Quad City Symphony. In her current hometown of Nashville, she is a sought-after session musician in the bustling recording industry.

MARIANA TEJEDA Dramaturg, Performing Sculptures _____

Mariana Tejeda is a multidisciplinary artist with two MFA degrees from the University of Iowa: one in stage management and one in Spanish creative writing. She is currently a third-year MFA candidate in choreography. In 2021, Mariana created The Laphin MirRoooar, a poetry exhibition where she invited artists from diverse backgrounds and disciplines to reinterpret her poems. Mariana co-choreographed Cempasúchil for Dance Gala 2023 and returns to



Dance Gala this year as visual artist for Barragán's work.

DEEMA TOTAH. PH.D. **Robotics Engineer**

Deema Totah, Ph.D., is a Palestinian-American, assistant professor in the Department of Mechanical Engineering at the University of Iowa, and director of the Robotics and Assistive Devices Laboratory (RAD Lab). Dr. Totah's research interests lie in improving the efficacy of assistive devices for customized



patient care. She is passionate about building robotic and mechatronic systems with integrated wearable sensing to test assistive device properties, study human movement and behavior, and understand how humans and devices interact with each other.

LAUREL SHOEMAKER Lighting Designer

Laurel has been working in the performing arts as a lighting designer and theater artist for 30 years. Credits include productions with Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Hubbard Street 2, the Chicago Dancing Festival, the Joyce Soho (with Charlotte Adams), the University of Iowa, and the University of Nebraska. Specific design credits include: *The Seen*, world premiere, Choreographer Jermaine Spivey, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago; *Peter and the*



Starcatcher, Mesa College, Arizona; The Chicago Dancing Festival (lighting director); *Flipside: The Patti Page Story*, 59 E. 59th Street Theatre, NYC, NY; *The Marriage of Figaro* (lighting), winner of the 2002 National Opera Association Award for Best Production, produced by the Martha Ellen Tye Opera Theatre at the University of Iowa; *Dead Man Walking* (scenic designer), winner of the 2008 National Opera Association Award for Best Production; and *Street Scene* (scenic designer), winner of the 2001 National Opera Association Award for best production. A native of California, Laurel has trained at the University of Nebraska and Florida State University, and early in her career she was mentored by Pat Simmons. She is a proud member of United Scenic Artists 829. She holds an MFA degree in lighting design from Florida State University and a BFA degree in theatrical design from University of Nebraska.

MARGARET WENK-KUCHLBAUER Costume Designer

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Margaret Wenk-Kuchlbauer is the costume and scenery designer for UI Performing Arts Production Unit, collaborating with many UI faculty and guests on productions for the Department of Dance and the School of Music.
