

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Hailed by *The New York Times* as "our leading new-music foursome," the Grammy-nominated JACK Quartet is one of the most respected experimental string quartets performing today, synchronized in its mission to create international community through transformative, mind-broadening experiences and close listening. Comprising violinists Christopher Otto and Austin Wulliman, violist John Pickford Richards, and cellist Jay Campbell, JACK was founded in 2005 and operates as a nonprofit organization dedicated to the performance, commissioning, and appreciation of 20th and 21st century string quartet music. Through intimate, longstanding relationships with many of today's most creative voices, the quartet has a prolific commissioning and recording catalog and has been nominated for three Grammy Awards.

JACK is featured in the ongoing celebrations of John Zorn's 70th birthday, including an album release of his complete string quartets, major global tour dates, and a premiere with Barbara Hannigan. Other season highlights include a three-concert day at Wigmore Hall, the premiere of Natacha Diels' *Beautiful Trouble* in Philadelphia, an Australian tour, and the fifth edition of JACK Studio.


Through its successful nonprofit model, the quartet has both self-commissioned and been commissioned to create hundreds of new works. The world's top composers choose JACK because of its singular dedication to innovation and experimentation, realized through the invisible labor of extensive studio time and the support of full-time leadership staff and a board of directors.

Committed to helping dismantle outmoded classical music pipelines for composers, JACK's all-access initiative JACK Studio funds collaborations with a selection of artists each year, who receive money, workshop time, mentorship, and resources to develop new works for string quartet. JACK receives more than 500 applications each season, and selects up to 15 composers or artists. More than 40 composers have worked with JACK through JACK Studio thus far.

Among many honors, JACK has earned an Avery Fisher Career Grant and Fromm Music Foundation Prize; been selected as *Musical America*'s 2018 Ensemble of the Year; and received Lincoln Center's Martin E. Segal Award, New Music USA's Trailblazer Award, and the CMA/ASCAP Award for Adventurous Programming.

JACK has been nominated for three GRAMMY Awards, the most recent being their albums of music by John Luther Adams—nominated in the 2022 and 2023 Best Ensemble Performance category. Other albums include music by Helmut Lachenmann, Catherine Lamb, Du Yun, Elliott Sharp, Zosha Di Castri, Iannis Xenakis, and an upcoming release of the complete quartets of Elliott Carter.

The JACK Quartet makes its home in New York City, where it is the quartet-inresidence at the Mannes School of Music at The New School. They also teach each summer at New Music on the Point in Vermont and at the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity. JACK has long-standing relationships with the University of Iowa String Quartet Residency Program, where they teach and collaborate with students each fall and spring, as well as with the Lucerne Festival Academy, of which the four members are all alumni. PROGRAM NOTES

JOHN ZORN

Born: September 2, 1953, New York City

"Music is about people for me. It's not about sounds... it's about putting people into challenging situations. And for me, challenges are opportunities."

-John Zorn

The music of John Zorn defies categorization—deliberately so. For a man of such wide-ranging eclectic interests and tastes, any label becomes a straitjacket, restrictive and limiting. Over the course of his long career, the New-York-based saxophonist-composer—conductor—band leader—arranger—producer has created music that spans a broad range of genres, including jazz, metal, avant-garde, punk, classical, and world

sounds. "Just as some people have a command of several languages, I can express myself fluently in several musical genres," he says.

Zorn's innate curiosity about just about everything has led him down many creative rabbit holes. Tonight's program, a sampler of Zorn's classical music from the last three decades, features four works for string quartet.

Cat o' Nine Tails

WORK COMPOSED: 1988. Commissioned by the Kronos Quartet.

ESTIMATED DURATION: 15 minutes

When the Kronos Quartet approached John Zorn about writing a string quartet for them, it gave Zorn the opportunity to create music in a new—for him—manner. Zorn's music up to this point relied on improvisatory, spontaneous contributions from the musicians he wrote for, whether the music was jazz, metal, punk, or some unclassifiable amalgamation of his own. Writing classical music presented a new challenge for Zorn: to make music in his own voice and also commit all the music to notation, rather than ask the players to improvise in performance. As Zorn explained, "Composing Cat o' Nine Tails was a breakthrough for me in terms of being able to relate to classical players on their own terms. To take advantage of classical musicians at their best, you give them written material, because that's what they do best."

When it comes to classical music, Zorn is an autodidact, so it follows that his classical works do not adhere to typical classical structural norms, or develop their ideas in the manner of Beethoven or Bartók. Cat o' Nine Tails, like the eponymous fearsome nine-tailed whip, flings styles and genres about, sometimes with breathtaking speed. Waltzes, popular tunes, old-timey string band music, and sound effects that suggest emotion or movement are all juxtaposed without any connective tissue.

PROGRAM NOTES

Zorn is a fan of the cartoon music of Carl Stalling, who composed for Warner Brothers' *Looney Tunes* and *Merrie Melodies* for more than 20 years. Zorn, in describing Stalling's music, writes, "This music is episodic—it doesn't develop the way normal music develops. See, to me, cartoon music is important because it follows a visual narrative. It's following the images on the screen. Now separate it from those images and you still have music. Valid, well-made music. But it does not follow any traditional development that I know of. It's following a visual narrative: all of a sudden this, all of a sudden that."

The Alchemist

WORK COMPOSED: 2011

ESTIMATED DURATION: 20 minutes

John Zorn is fascinated by mysticism, occultism, spiritual quests, and religious explorations of the Divine. These subjects have inspired several works, including *The Alchemist*. Zorn's detailed subtitle explains his creative source material: "a true and faithful chronicling of the esoteric spiritual conferences and concomitant hermetic actions conducted by Her Majesty's Alchemist Dr. John Dee and one Edward Kelley invoking the Nine Hierarchies of Angelic Orders to visible appearance, circa 1587."

John Dee (1527-c. 1608) served as the Court Astronomer to Queen Elizabeth I. He was also a mathematician, astrologer, alchemist, and student of magic and the occult. Together with Edward Kelley, also an occultist, the two men experimented with magic and divination.

Zorn's *Alchemist* is structured along the nine sections of Dee's and Kelley's "Order of the Heavenly Host," also known as the Hierarchy of Angels. Zorn describes the music as "a trip through an Alchemist's laboratory. A séance invoking angelic orders. Virtuosic lyricism, numerology, prayers, canons, contrapuntal complexity, alchemical procedures (distillation, calcination, crystallization, sublimation, purification, rotation) and the ghost of a fugue" (Beethoven's *Grosse Fuge* makes an appearance, although it quickly morphs into something far removed from Beethoven's aesthetic). Like *Cat o' Nine Tails*, the music is episodic, mercurial, and full of abrupt mood shifts.

The Remedy of Fortune

WORK COMPOSED: 2015. Commissioned by the JACK Quartet.

ESTIMATED DURATION: 16 minutes

Le Remède de Fortune, a medieval narrative poem by the French poet and composer Guillaume de Machaut (c. 1300–1377), serves as Zorn's creative scaffold for his eponymous string quartet. In the poem, Machaut ruminates on the nature of Fortune, or Fate—can humanity escape what Fortune decrees, or is every person's destiny immutable? Or, to put it another way, is there a 'remedy,' for Fortune's inexorability, a way of altering or mitigating its decree? Machaut's poem describes Fortune as

"neither assured nor stable, nor just, nor lawful and true. When she is thought to be charitable, she is greedy, harsh, changing and frightful."

Although inspired by a medieval troubadour, Zorn's interpretation of Machaut's poem is unflinchingly contemporary, as he explores the shifting, dynamic progression of romantic love through pain, desire, devotion, hope, beauty, longing, ecstasy, intoxication, frustration, anger, and—ultimately—despair.

Necronomicon

WORK COMPOSED: 2003. First performed by the Crowley Quartet.


ESTIMATED DURATION: 23 minutes

"[Necronomicon is] a tour de force of Black Magic and Alchemy," writes John Zorn, "with perhaps the most intense ensemble writing I've yet achieved ... Because one can never know where the creative spark comes from or why it exists, it must be treasured as Mystery ... The process of composing music is often at its best when the piece is seemingly writing itself and the composer is merely an observer. [Necronomicon] came about in such an atmosphere, and months of preparation were involved before putting pencil to paper ... [The piece] transcended my expectation and my abilities."

Zorn borrowed his title from the science-fiction writer H. P. Lovecraft, and fused this magical-sounding word with ideas from the writings of British occultist Aleister Crowley (1875–1947). In a 2017 review of a performance by the JACK Quartet, David Wright observed, "Zorn's Necronomicon ... evoked mysticism and the occult in their most lurid guises, including hard-driving rock in the opening movement 'Conjurations'; a Hebraic cello melody with persistent noisy interruptions in 'The Magus'; a blaze of fast-fingered virtuosity in 'Thought-Forms'; a rich slow vibrato suggesting primeval depths in 'Incunabula'; and raw Bartókian energy to invoke the mythical sexual demon 'Asmodeus.'"


